Objectives & Methodology

Research Objectives

The overarching objective of the research was to measure the impact of the National Eucharistic Revival:

- ***Personal Transformation:***
Eucharistic belief, ministry work, evangelization confidence, faith activities, attitudinal changes in faith perspective and experience
- ***Parish Community Engagement:***
Impact on parish Eucharistic devotion and availability of (and engagement in) various faith-related activities
- ***Challenges and Future Considerations:***
To help inform similar future initiatives



Nearly 2,500 respondents in the US completed an online, 15-minute survey in the summer and fall of 2025, one year after the initial national Pilgrimage and Congress.

Study Topic Note

- Neither set of respondents (ecclesial or lay Catholics) knew the subject of the study when invited to participate
- Additionally, faith activity changes over time were *not* asked in the context of the Revival until later in the survey

* Sourced from online panels of the General Population (GenPop). Went to Mass at least monthly, though 83% went to Mass at least weekly.

The Ecclesial sample consisted mostly of priests but included a fair number of staff and other Point Persons.





Enthusiasm & Promotion

Strong leadership enthusiasm at all levels created an environment primed for implementation of the Revival.

- Leadership buy-in was strong at all levels, creating a solid foundation for parish-level implementation
 - *Bishops and pastors demonstrated overwhelming support for the Revival, with 88% of Ecclesial respondents describing their bishop as enthusiastic or supportive.*
 - *Pastors showed even stronger enthusiasm.*
- Outside of the Mass, parish engagement centered on Eucharistic adoration and processions as the primary local activities.

Leadership enthusiasm for the Revival was strong at every level, with 92% of bishops described as supportive by clergy and 92% of pastors describing themselves as supportive.

Personal Impact


Personal renewal among clergy strengthened their capacity to serve as witnesses to their parishioners and confident evangelizers.

- Nearly half (49%) of clergy report **feeling more encouraged** since the Revival began.
- Also nearly half (48%) of clergy feel **more comfortable encouraging others to share their faith**, indicating the Revival built ministerial confidence.
- The Revival also influenced clergy's **pastoral approach and homiletic content**, demonstrating integration into everyday ministry.

This past favorable experience will help future revival enthusiasm among clergy

Nearly half of clergy (49%) report feeling more encouraged since the Revival began, suggesting the Revival provided a meaningful morale boost.


Revival Impact on General Clergy Morale

Nearly half of clergy reported an increased comfort in encouraging others to share their faith, indicating an impact on removing barriers to evangelization.


Comfort in Encouraging Others to Share their Faith

Changes to Ministerial Approach




The Revival had some direct influence on preaching about the Eucharist, with nearly one-third reporting an influence on the frequency with which they did so.

Parish / Diocesan Impact

Observable changes in parish communities validated clergy efforts and provided hope for continued growth beyond the Revival's official conclusion.


- Clergy report strong improvement in **Eucharistic devotion and sacramental life in their parish communities**, and most see the National Eucharistic Revival as a contributor to this renewal.
- The Revival's impact was strongest in areas directly tied to **Eucharistic worship and belief in the Real Presence**, with secondary gains in evangelization and community life.
- **Both national and local activities** were identified among the most fruitful Revival activities in terms of impact at the parish level.
- While the Revival efforts had the greatest impact among engaged Catholics, most reported at least some impact among **all groups of Catholics**

Clergy report strong gains in Eucharistic devotion and sacramental life in their communities. Most see the National Eucharistic Revival as a meaningful contributor to this renewal.



National events such as the Congress (64%) and Pilgrimage (63%) delivered deep impact for attendees, while emphasis on Eucharistic adoration and local processions were seen as the most fruitful of Revival activities.




Personal Impact

Leading Revival activities deepened the personal faith of Point Persons as well, while building their capacity as evangelizers and catechists.

- Non-Clergy Point Persons experienced significant **personal spiritual growth** through their involvement in the Revival.
- Staff Point Persons reported changes to their **ministerial approach**, indicating the Revival influenced their professional practices beyond event coordination.
- Both staff and parishioner Point Persons demonstrated high levels of **personal investment**, participating as both organizers and disciples.

Staff Point Persons reported significant changes to their ministerial approach since 2021, indicating the Revival influenced their professional practices beyond event coordination.

Changes to Ministerial Approach



Both staff and parishioner Point Persons experienced significant growth in personal spirituality and Eucharistic devotion.


Challenges

Addressing capacity constraints and providing clearer guidance will be essential for future initiatives to achieve broader and more sustainable impact.

- As with priests and deacons, Point Persons also experienced two key obstacles: **external barriers and internal constraints**.
- Staff cited **resource limitations and time constraints** at higher rates (63% and 58%), while parishioners more often mentioned **lack of awareness among target audiences** (51%).
- The burden of local implementation fell heavily on volunteers and part-time staff, who often felt they lacked institutional support for sustainable programming.

Reaching beyond already-engaged Catholics was the most often cited challenge of the Revival, followed by limited resources and staff.



Summary

The Revival had a profoundly positive and lasting impact on the ecclesial segment. While challenges exist, these can be overcome with careful planning, should another event be considered for the future.


Composition of Lay Catholic Sample

Non-Participating Contacts – 26%

- Did NOT actively participate in any Revival activities
- Most came from the USCCB's newsletter (HRN) distribution list; they were aware and connected, just not involved

Local Participants – 24%

- Participated in local Revival activities such as local processions, small groups, and Revival-specific holy hours
- Did NOT participate in either national event




Over three-quarters of Congress attendees attended in-person and for most of the event, if not all. Most came to Congress as part of organized groups; only one in five attended alone.


HOW we measured:

For all categories, we asked them to rate each item twice using a 5-point scale; (1) as it is today and (2) in 2021, post-COVID. For each scale, we combine the “Top 2” scores for reporting (in bold below):

- **Frequency:** *Never – Rarely – Sometimes – Often – Very often*
- **Importance:** *Not – Slightly – Moderately – Very – Extremely*
- **Conviction:** *Not at all – A little – Somewhat – Quite a lot – Completely*
- **Understanding:** *Very limited – Basic – Good – Strong – Expert*

The greatest growth in importance was observed in volunteering and spending time in Eucharistic adoration.



Faith-related activities all showed significant increases since 2021. Volunteering had the greatest net increase.

Change in *Frequency of Faith-Related Activities Over Last 4 Years*



Lay Catholics reported stronger conviction in their faith, with strengthened core beliefs and more comfort evangelizing.

Changes in the Faith Experience

The Revival contributed to strong growth in all areas measured, including among those who were already strong in their faith

- Lay Catholics report substantial growth across multiple dimensions of faith life: increased participation in activities, greater importance placed on faith elements, stronger conviction in Catholic teachings, and deeper understanding of Church doctrine.
- Growth was not limited to one area: participants experienced holistic development, suggesting the Revival touched head (understanding), heart (conviction of belief), hands (participation), and priorities (importance).
- National Participants (those who attended the Pilgrimage or Congress) reported this growth at an even greater level; it is clear that national events were greatly impactful.

Other Changes Since 2021


The data suggests the Revival contributed to a holistic deepening of Catholic faith and practice, not just increased awareness of Eucharistic teaching.

- Lay Catholics report substantial growth across all measured dimensions of faith life since 2021, with particularly strong gains in Eucharistic devotion and sacramental participation.
- Changes were not limited to knowledge or beliefs: Lay Catholics also report behavioral changes, including increased frequency of prayer, adoration, and confession.
- Lay Catholics attribute these changes to multiple factors, with the Revival standing out as a significant influence alongside personal experiences and parish initiatives.


The vast majority of Lay Catholics describe their overall level of faith as stronger now than in 2021, with more than one-third reporting it is "much stronger" rather than just "somewhat stronger."



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
When asked to directly compare their current practices to 2021, Lay Catholics overwhelmingly report praying more, attending adoration more frequently, and going to confession more often.

Evangelization activities (sharing faith with others, inviting people to church, and discussing the Eucharist) greatly increased since 2021. This increase was more prevalent among Revival participants.

Frequency of *Evangelization* Activities, Compared to 2021





Availability of Faith Activity Opportunities, Compared to 2021





Personal Impact of the Revival


The Eucharistic Revival amplified and accelerated Catholics' existing spiritual journeys.

- Participants attribute their general faith growth to multiple influences, with the National Eucharistic Congress and local Revival activities ranking as the most impactful factors.
- While major national events (Congress, Pilgrimage) had great personal impact, even those who did not attend and participated in other ways were positively influenced by local Revival activities.

Nearly half of participants reported that the Congress had a “Significant” or “Major” influence on general life changes.

Faith Events that Influenced General Life Changes



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

Concluding Thoughts

One year after the major events, it is clear that the Revival had very positive outcomes:

- It fostered personal renewal and confidence among those leading and supporting the Revival, strengthening morale, Eucharistic focus, and comfort evangelizing
- That renewal translated into parish-level impact, with increased engagement in prayer, Eucharistic adoration, confession, and service across communities
- The effects extended beyond internal Church leadership: evangelization activity grew more broadly, strongest among national event participants but evident well beyond that group


The evidence suggests that a future Revival could bear similar fruit and, with clear support and capacity, potentially expand its reach further.


Parish / Diocesan Involvement in the Revival

Personal Involvement in the Revival




Clergy Morale


Comfort in Encouraging Others to Share their Faith

Changes Seen Compared to 3 Years Ago and Perceived Impact of the Revival





Revival Impact in Context with Other Events' Impact on Positive Changes





The Revival faced two main categories of challenges: external obstacles (such as reaching less-engaged Catholics) alongside internal constraints (such as limited time, resources, and coordination issues).

Challenges Limiting Revival Impact



- For efforts like this to achieve broader impact, more intentional strategies may be needed to engage Catholics who are less engaged.
- Sustained success will require additional support, resources, and clarity to relieve the burden on parish staff and volunteers and enable consistent implementation.

Point Persons requested more coordinated guidance, ready-to-use resources, and clearer implementation frameworks to ease the burden of promoting Revival activities at the local level.


Point Persons' Desired Support from the USCCB / Diocese


Point Persons reported high levels of bishop support, with 85% perceiving their bishops as enthusiastic or actively supportive of the Revival.

Staff point persons perceived higher pastoral enthusiasm (73%) than parishioner point persons (66%), likely attributed to the closer relationships they have with their pastor.

(Among those who answered)



Both staff and parishioner Point Persons reported that parishes engaged primarily through Eucharistic adoration and processions, mirroring the pattern seen among ordained respondents.

Parish / Diocesan Involvement in the Revival




Across the board, staff reported more parish and diocesan involvement than did parishioners; this, too, is likely due to being more closely connected with their institutions.




These gaps were greatest in adoration events, local processions, and family catechesis.





Point Persons attributed positive parish changes to multiple factors, with the Revival ranking alongside pastoral transitions and post-pandemic recovery as a significant influence.


Revival Impact in Context with Other Events' Impact on Positive Changes



Audience engagement was high, reflecting effective communication strategies. Point Persons reported the greatest success engaging already-active Catholics such as those regularly attending Mass and volunteering.

While inactive Catholics and those on the margins of parish life proved hardest to reach through Revival activities, half of the Point Persons reported at least some success in engaging with them through the Revival.







...live in a diocese along the National Eucharistic Pilgrimage route










Revival Participation Details

Farthest Distance Traveled for Any Revival Event






Sources of Knowledge about the Revival Events


Importance Shift: 2021 to Today, Very or Extremely Important


Frequency Shift: 2021 to Today, Often or Very Often


Conviction of Belief Shift: 2021 to Today

Understanding Shift: 2021 to Today




Perceived Attendance of Faith Activity Opportunities, Compared to 2021




